BANDS AND PROSPERITY

E LKHART, INDIANA, the Band City, is very prosperous because the band companies are busy. The officers of the various companies are optimistic regarding the possibilities for 1939.

Mr. L. L. Sams, sales promotion manager of C. G. Conn, Ltd., recently made the following statement which will be of interest to all manufacturers: "We have had the biggest holiday business in our entire history. HOW A "DEAD" BAND WAS REVIVED

The present Department of Bands at the Carl Schurz High School was organized under the direction of Captain Clayborne Harvey, beginning October 26, 1936.

The Department had ceased to exist nearly four years prior to this date, rendering it necessary to start practically from the beginning. All band members had graduated. There was, however a small group of enthusiastic students which served as a nucleus around which the new department could be started. With the help of these students, a cooperative faculty and school administrative staff, the end of the first semester 1936-37 saw a band department well under way.

By careful culling and organizing, at the beginning of the second semester of 1936-37 a concert band, a military band and three beginners' classes were assembled. The concert band entered the Class A, Group II Chicago Public High Schools band contest the spring of that semester and received a grade of G. The Military Band took part in all ceremonies and parades connected with the Schurz R.O.T.C., not only furnished music for the Schurz Unit at the spring Federal Inspection but played the inspection for a neighboring high school which at that time had no military band.

October 26, 1938 marked the end of the second anniversary for the new department. During this period the department had grown to an enrollment of nearly three hundred students. The Concert Band had entered another Chicago Public High Schools contest for which it was awarded a grade of Superior. Starting
